
Figure 10.1.13.

Relations amongst international organizations concerned with Islam (A-D, F)

This image results from an extraction of 61 international organizations specifically concerned with "Islam" (in their title). These do not therefore include those which may have such a prime focus but do not include it in their title. The selection has been limited to those of types A-D and F, namely the most international in scope. However they do not include themany Sufireligious orders (type R), nor do they include Islamic religious movements that do not take the form of international organizations. The bodies have been positioned around a circle and are denoted by smaller circles of varying diameter (according to the number of links of any type that they have to other bodies, not necessarily those in the figure). The lines across the major circle represent the relationships between them - of any type. In terms of the classical geometric patterns of Islamic culture, this figure raises the question of how such patterns might be better understood as presenting the complexities of the Islamic world.
